



Sources of Federal Power






U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS)



HOW DOES A BILL BECOME A LAW?

435

Representatives

Each state receives representation based on its population but is entitled to at least one Representative. Each representative serves for a two-year term. The House was granted the sole exclusive powers: the power to initiate revenue bills, impeach officials, and elect the president in electoral college deadlocks.

Bill is referred to House committee or subcommittee

Bill is referred to senate committee or subcommittee



Senators

Each U.S. state is represented by two senators regardless of population. This ensures equal representation of each state in the Senate. Senators serve staggered six-year terms.

Bill becomes Law

Veto
The President can Veto (Decline) the Bill. Bill can still pass but will be voted by House or Senate and receive 2/3 vote to pass

Pork Barrel
Typically, "pork" involves funding programs whose economic benefits are concentrated in a particular area but whose costs are spread among all taxpayers.

Earmark
Earmarks are funds provided by Congress for projects or bypassing the Presidential evaluation processes.

Fillbuster
AKA - "Talking a bill to death." An informal term for filibuster or other procedures used to prevent a vote on a bill in the Senate.

State Legislative Process

THE EQUAL ACCESS TO ABORTION COVERAGE IN HEALTH INSURANCE (EACH Woman) ACT

- First, the bill respects that every woman should be able to make her own decisions about pregnancy.
- If a woman gets her care or insurance through the federal government, she will be covered for all pregnancy-related care,

THE EQUAL ACCESS TO ABORTION COVERAGE IN HEALTH INSURANCE (EACH Woman) ACT

- Second, the EACH Woman Act prohibits political interference with decisions of private health insurance companies to offer coverage for abortion care. Federal, state and local legislators will not be able to interfere with the private insurance market to prevent insurance companies from providing abortion coverage.

Identifying & Engaging the Players: Overview

- Know **WHAT** your goals are
- Determine **WHERE** you can effect change
- Identify **WHO** you need to contact and **WHY**
- Strategize **HOW** to engage policy maker(s)

Know **WHAT** your goals are

- You have draft legislation and need to find a "champion" for it (e.g., Congresswoman Barbara Lee and the REPEAL HIV Discrimination Act)
- You have policy concerns and need someone who can/should address it


Determine WHERE will you Effect Change

- Municipal, state, federal, international (*yes, international*) level?
- The “higher up” you go, the harder it is to make change
- Remember end goal: enacting specific laws vs. raising awareness



Identify WHO to contact & WHY

- What has worked in the past?
 - Look to previous advocacy efforts
 - What form of contact does your policy maker respond best to?
- How to contact them: Letters, phone-calls, in-district visits, testimony



Strategize HOW to engage

- Knowing how other initiatives have succeeded (and failed) can help you determine your method of contact
- What form of contact does your policy maker respond best to?
- E.g., Ban the box city initiative: council hearing where you provide testimony; sending letters/petitions
